CLIENT EVALUATION OF MIDWIFERY CARE

This Client Evaluation Questionnaire is provided by the College of Midwives to assist BC midwives in obtaining feedback about their care from their clients. BC midwives must provide each primary care client with a quality of care evaluation form within six months of the client being discharged from care and request that the client complete and return the evaluation to the member's practice. These evaluations may be returned anonymously. Midwives review these evaluations at intervals throughout the year to consider how they can improve their practice.
